Philly Career Launch *Industry At-A-Glance* **The Utilities Industry in Philadelphia**

Utility services are fundamental to modern society. The utilities industry is made up of companies that build and maintain the infrastructure needed to provide electricity, gas, and water, or to manage wastewater and sewage. Examples of utilities in Philadelphia are: PECO Energy, Philadelphia Gas Works (PGW), and the Philadelphia Water Department.

The utilities industry at the national level has grown slowly over the past decade and is even projected to decline over the next decade.² However, with the federal government's goal of reaching net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050, the "energy infrastructure" portion of the industry is fundamentally shifting to "clean energy jobs." In 2022, 3.1 million jobs, or 40 percent of all energy jobs, met the definition of clean energy jobs. As a group, clean energy jobs are growing faster than overall US jobs.³

Most positions in the utilities industry require at least a high school degree and sometimes vocational training in a skilled trade. Jobs vary greatly in their responsibilities and generally have good pay. Some are in the **maintenance** area, such as ensuring a clean work environment or repairing broken equipment. Others involve operating **heavy equipment**, like forklift operators who move materials and equipment. **Out-in-the field** positions include inspectors and meter readers. Here are some examples of positions in the utilities industry:
