

#### DEAR FREE LIBRARY OF PHILADELPHIA SUPPORTERS,

Fiscal year 2023 has been a time of exciting growth and change for the Free Library and the Foundation. The Free Library continued to offer the programs that our communities have enjoyed through the years while adding new ways for Philadelphians of all ages to enjoy and learn at our neighborhood libraries, and the Foundation's donors have provided critical financial support to many of these initiatives.

The Free Library carried out its mission to advance literacy, guide learning, and inspire curiosity with offerings such as the Author Events Series, which featured 120 programs; and the Literacy Enrichment Afterschool Program (LEAP), which provided homework help and enrichment opportunities to K-12 students in neighborhood libraries across the city.

Family Literacies and Community Connections, a new pilot program made possible by donor support, began serving Philadelphians from Afghanistan by connecting them to local resources and tools to support their acclimation. In addition, the Foundation supported the Library's signature One Book, One Philadelphia program, which each year features a new title and related programming. The 2023 selection was Interior Chinatown by Charles Yu, with youth companion titles American Born Chinese by Gene Luen Yang and Drawn Together written by Minh Lê and illustrated by Dan Santat. The season launched in April with a community fair at the Parkway Central Library; and the June finale included a conversation with Yu at the Community College of Philadelphia and a festive karaoke party at the Asian Arts Initiative.

To continue to advance the Foundation's work, in fiscal year 2023 the Board of Directors launched the search for an Executive Director to partner with Kelly Richards as the organization defines its strategy and direction going forward. We look forward to working with Monique Moore Pryor, our Executive Director, as the Foundation continues to support the critical services and programs offered by the Free Library.

On behalf of the Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation Board of Directors, I offer my deepest gratitude to all of our donors. Your generosity and dedication to this organization positively impacts our city. We are honored to have your support.







## Teen Programs and Spaces at the Parkway Central Library

On April 12, 2023, the fourth anniversary of its opening, the Marie and Joseph Field Teen Center hosted a celebration with teen patrons. Since its launch, the Field Teen Center has offered a variety of beloved events, and this year featured new and expanded engagement opportunities. A total of 455 Field Teen Center programs took place in fiscal year 2023.

The Maker Lab, adjacent to the Field Teen Center, continued with renovations while offering programs. The space has new acoustic draping and computers, and additional furnishings are forthcoming. Current Field Teen Center programs include SAGA (Sexuality and Gender Acceptance) Club and the Third Thursday Book Club. With the planned hiring of a Maker Mentor, the Field Teen Center hopes to offer

daily maker programs highlighting art, music, dance, and technology.

The Field Teen Center hosted its first annual prom in May 2023 at Parkway Central's Skyline Room and Terrace. The teen-selected theme—Villains' Night was brought to life by decorations, catering, music, and performances.



## Summer of Wonder Celebrates its 100th Anniversary

Summer of Wonder is a program for all ages, online and in neighborhood libraries, which invites participants to attend Library programs and activities, and encourages students to read during the summer months. 2020 marked the 100th anniversary of the Free Library of Philadelphia's summer reading program. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, a belated celebration was held on June 10, 2023, at the Cecil B. Moore Library in North Philadelphia. Attendees enjoyed face painting, balloon animals, storytelling, crafts, and a dance workshop; and celebrated the culmination of the "Week of Play," which launched Summer of Wonder 2023. This year children received game boards to track their summer reading and stickers for completing activities.

The Library's other signature summer offerings include Science in the Summer and the Summer Camp Challenge. Science in the Summer, sponsored by GSK and administered by The Franklin Institute, engages second through sixth-graders in activities designed to increase confidence and encourage interest in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) careers. Through funding from the William Penn Foundation, Summer Camp Challenge participants receive materials and training to incorporate one hour of literacy activities into daily camp programming. Cumulatively, these programs provide ongoing engagement with the Library and help offset "summer slide," the gap in learning that can happen between school years.



## LEAP Welcomes Students at 5,000+ Programs

The Literacy Enrichment **Afterschool Program** (LEAP) provides homework help, literacy support, and STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics) activities for K-12 students in neighborhood libraries



throughout Philadelphia, offering a safe space to gather during out-of-school time hours. LEAP activities included a partnership with The Franklin **Institute** to teach the science of wind; participation in Peace Day Philly, in which students practiced peaceful ways to resolve conflict; and opportunities to learn about Black women innovators during Black History Month. Fiscal year 2023 featured over 5,000 online and in-person programs for more than 46,800 participants and attendees.

After School Leaders and Teen Leadership Assistants support LEAP's work online and in neighborhood libraries. Through funding from the City of Philadelphia's Office of Children and Families, this year LEAP hired over 50 teens (ages 14-18) as Teen Leadership Assistants. These teens also received professional development in career readiness, financial literacy, and LEAP program design. About their experience, one Teen Leadership Assistant shared: "Working as a Teen Leadership Assistant is an experience that will make you kinder and wiser. You will feel seen as a person by everyone around you, be it kids, After School Leaders, or Library staff."

## Neighborhood Library Capital Improvements Underway Across Philadelphia

The Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation partners with the City of Philadelphia to enliven communities with innovative, inclusive, and inspiring programming; and raise contributions from donors to support capital improvements in neighborhood libraries. Modern, safe spaces in which community members can enjoy programs are essential to delivering on the Library's mission to advance literacy, quide learning, and inspire curiosity across Philadelphia.

This fiscal year, capital work generously funded by the City of Philadelphia's **Rebuild** initiative officially began at the Kingsessing and Paschalville libraries, both in Southwest Philadelphia. Rebuild is a historic investment in neighborhood parks, recreation centers, and libraries across Philadelphia. In total, 12 neighborhood libraries will undergo major renovations or projects such as HVAC and roof improvements as part of the Rebuild program.

Private support raised through the Foundation provides enhancements to library renovations that are paid for through Rebuild dollars. For example, at Paschalville, the Knight Foundation has generously pledged \$1 million to ensure that the newly renovated library



## Lillian Marrero Library Hosts Teen Writing Workshop

Over the past year, staff at the Lillian Marrero Library in North Philadelphia noticed an increase in the number of teens visiting the branch. To better serve these patrons, the Library staff engaged the teens in planning conversations about programming, and found a common interest in creative writing. Thanks to a generous gift from Dale and Richard Levy, beginning in May 2023, the Lillian Marrero Library hosted a four-week poetry and songwriting workshop for teens. Under the instruction of a local bilingual artist (Spanish and English), the students were introduced to written and vocal works by Meek Mills, the late Maya Angelou and Biggie Smalls (The Notorious B.I.G), and teen poetry slam champion Jae Nichelle, among others.

will be a tech-enabled hub that supports the needs of this community. This grant supports community engagement and outreach; development and piloting of new programming; the purchase of state-of-the art technology and equipment; and discreet direct construction costs, including the creation of a media lab.

In addition to these Rebuild sites, the Frankford Library, in lower Northeast Philadelphia, is undergoing a critical \$5.5 million renovation made possible by generous gifts to the Free Library Foundation from individuals, foundations, and corporations. Support from the William Penn Foundation, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program, the Pennsylvania Department of Education Office of Commonwealth Libraries's Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund, the Patrick J. McGovern Foundation, and The McLean Contributionship will give Frankford Library a fully

renovated exterior and interior, featuring cosmetic upgrades, new meeting rooms, an ADA-compliant lift that provides access to programming spaces on the lower level, and a reconfiguration of the main staircase

# Providing Library Resources for Recently-Arrived Afghan Community Members

Philadelphia is a Certified Welcoming city that celebrates many immigrant and refugee communities. In recent years, the city has become home to more than 800 refugees from Afghanistan. A majority of these new community members have settled in Northeast Philadelphia and, thanks to support from an anonymous donor, the pilot program **Family Literacies and Community Connections** was launched at Northeast Regional Library in fiscal year 2023.

Three Afghan neighbors were hired as Community Connectors to introduce the Library and its services to new residents. Over a period of several months, Afghan refugees new to Philadelphia came to Northeast Regional, enjoying family storytimes and other programming, and obtaining their Library cards. The donor's contribution funded the purchase of 125 tablet devices for Afghan families. Community Connectors and other participants were also introduced to nearby businesses interested in hiring from the Afghan community. Continued programming at Northeast Regional in fiscal year 2024 will help Afghan community members build digital literacy skills, learn internet safety, and connect with the Library's digital resources, including reading lists, electronic and audio books, language learning programs, and job seeker resources.





# Adult Education Resources at the Languages and Learning Center

The Languages and Learning Center (LLC), launched in September 2019, serves adults seeking to improve their English, basic reading and writing, digital literacy, and/or world language skills. Generously supported by funding from the Comcast NBCUniversal Foundation, BNY Mellon Mid-Atlantic Charitable Trusts, the Wish You Well Foundation, and individual donors, the LLC provides learners with a welcoming, accessible learning environment.

While its physical resources are located at the Parkway Central Library, the LLC supports individuals' literacy and learning goals across Philadelphia and online. The LLC's signature programs include digital literacy instruction and a variety of classes and programs with digital components. Leamos ("Let's Read") welcomes Spanish-speaking adults who do not yet know how to read and write in Spanish, helping them to develop their skills through self-paced online lessons, and with access to a Spanish-speaking tutor. Beginning English Language Learning classes teach the basic vocabulary, grammar, and digital skills necessary to participate in more advanced classes. GED® and HiSET® preparation offers students studying for their high school equivalency exams self-paced, independent, and remote learning options. Instruction through Northstar Digital Literacy trainings gives learners the basic skills to perform tasks on computers and online.

Of her involvement with the LLC, Hajime says:

"I am from Japan and have experienced so many Library language programs that are free, fun, and informative, including Edible Alphabet, grammar courses, and a reading circle. These experiences encouraged me to take the GED® class online. Last summer, I jumped at the chance to teach the Japanese class online, and I've loved introducing some of Japan's culture to others. I am very thankful that I am a part of the Library community."

After pandemic-related closures paused a full rollout of the LLC's initiatives, 2023 was the first year in which the Library expanded LLC programs to neighborhood libraries. In addition to continuing to host educational programs online and in person at Parkway Central, LLC programming was offered at the Lillian Marrero Library in North Philadelphia, the Independence Library in Center City, and the Whitman Library in South Philadelphia. In fiscal year 2023, the LLC supported over 8,400 adult learners, advancing their learning goals and increasing their confidence in critical skill areas. In fiscal year 2024, the LLC will continue to reach new and existing patrons through further digital offerings and in-person opportunities across Philadelphia.

## Visiting Philadelphia's Treasures: The Collections **Crawl Series**

The Free Library of Philadelphia is regarded for its renowned Special Collections, which enhance the Library's mission by making rare and historic materials accessible, providing knowledgeable research services, and offering programs that promote understanding of our shared cultural heritage. To spotlight the importance and depth of the historical treasures in and around Philadelphia, including the Library's own holdings, in fiscal year 2023 the Foundation introduced our newest educational series: the **Collections Crawl**. This series provides opportunities for intimate, behind-the-scenes visits at some of our region's most admired collections and archives.

The series debuted in

December 2022 with a visit to the Winterthur Museum, Garden & Library, which included an exhibition tour and time spent in the rare book library. Additional sold-out events showcased the special collections of the historic Athenaeum of Philadelphia and the American Philosophical Society, which featured an exhibition tour and a library highlights and conservation presentation.

We are excited to continue the Collections Crawl series at a new set of locations in fiscal year 2024!





## **Author Events** Showcase Literary Talent

Over the course of its decades-long history, the Free Library's **Author Events Series** has grown to feature a robust event calendar with acclaimed novelists, renowned historians, celebrated public figures, and more. One of the Library's most recognized and beloved offerings, the series embodies the Library's mission: to advance literacy, quide learning, and inspire curiosity.

In fiscal year 2023, we welcomed many impressive authors, including Pulitzer Prize-winners Buzz Bissinger, Hernan Diaz, and Maggie Haberman; Adam Gopnick of The New Yorker; journalist Mehdi Hasan; co-star of the hit TV show Black-ish Jenifer Lewis; Ari Shapiro of NPR; and Grammy Award nominee Michelle Zauner. Nearly 15,000 attendees participated in this year's series, and the Author Events' podcasts and YouTube videos have been shared more than two million times with Philadelphians and listeners from around the world.

Author Events speak to topics across the public, civic, and humanities spheres. In addition to bringing attention to a diverse array of authors, the series advances cultural access and equity by offering many free programs. To support these offerings, in fiscal year 2023, the Foundation introduced a new pay what you wish model for our free Author Events. Beyond the ongoing revenue provided by ticketed programs, these donations will help sustain this engaging series for years to come.

## The Inaugural Community Impact Awards

In fiscal year 2023, the Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation was proud to launch the Community Impact Awards, created to recognize and honor organizations, individuals, and philanthropists whose work aligns with the Free Library's mission to advance literacy, quide learning, and inspire curiosity.

The inaugural awardees were selected for their impact in Early Childhood Literacy through direct service in their communities. The African American Children's Book **Project** has connected children to culture-celebrating and identity-affirming storytelling for over 30 years. Barbershop Books provides culturally responsive children's books in accessible places and encourages

community members to become literacy advocates. Joyful Readers provides quality, skilled, individualized reading tutoring. Philibros increases access to Spanish language books across Philadelphia and helps readers of all ages stay connected to their culture through stories. Reading Allowed has created a new model for specialized literacy tutoring for Philadelphia school-age children. Read to Succeed Philadelphia assists children with getting the help they need to close their reading skills gap.

We thank each of the selected organizations for their great service to our communities, and are delighted to honor them as our first cohort of Community Impact Award recipients.



On October 25, 2022, Pepper members kicked off the fall Author Events season with a special meet-and-greet with journalist Maggie Haberman prior to her public Author Event. Pontone has regularly made visits to the Maps Department at the Parkway Central Library to review the historic Hexamer Atlas survey map of her neighborhood in support of her preservation work with the East Falls Historical Society. The Hexamer Atlas, which totals over 170 volumes, provides a parcel-by-parcel view and history of building and land usage over the many decades of its creation. Because of its age, many volumes of the Atlas are dilapidated and in need of delicate conservation. The Foundation expresses our deepest thanks to Nancy for generously supporting the conservation of an 1893-1895 Hexamer Atlas volume that details East Falls. The year-long project was conducted by the Conservation Center for Art and Historic Artifacts (CCAHA) and included repair of damaged pages, spine restitching, surface cleaning, repair and reconditioning of the leather cover and tabs, and more.

#### THE YEAR AHEAD

The Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation is committed to resourcing programs and activities that advance literacy, guide learning, and inspire curiosity throughout the region, and to helping the Free Library deliver on the promise of an equitable future for Philadelphia children, families, and communities.

#### Neighborhood libraries undergoing renovations:

The Frankford, Kingsessing, and Paschalville libraries were undergoing major renovations by the close of fiscal year 2023 thanks to a combination of the City of Philadelphia's Rebuild initiative and philanthropic support through contributions to the Free Library of Philadelphia Foundation. In fiscal year 2024, the Blanche A. Nixon/Cobbs Creek, Cecil B. Moore, Lawncrest, and Richmond libraries will also begin renovations. We anticipate a number of newly renovated libraries reopening in 2024!

The Art and Influence of John Dowell opening fall 2023: This exhibition and related programming will showcase the master printmaker and educator's contributions to his field, his city, and the Free Library's collections. It will highlight Dowell as a vital contemporary voice of the Philadelphia experience, and will welcome visitors to the Library, which he personally values because "a Black child can go for free."
